## Certified Pedorthist (Canada) Examination Information

The College of Pedorthics of Canada has scheduled the examination leading to the professional designation Certified Pedorthist (Canada). The following information outlines the eligibility requirements and application procedures.

### WRITTEN EXAMINATION:

### CLINICAL EXAMINATION:

**Important note:** *Only candidates who have passed the written exam are eligible.*  
**Exam Date:** November 27, 2010  
**Time:** 1 1/2 hr times will be allocated between 9:00 am to 5:00 pm  
**Locations:** Vancouver BC, Calgary AB, Toronto ON, Halifax, NS

Please note that sites will only be offered where there is sufficient candidate request.

### APPLICATION

**DEADLINE:** September 17, 2010  
Application form, proof of eligibility and fees must be received by the deadline,  
NO EXCEPTIONS.

**FEES:** One payment of \$275 plus GST or HST where applicable (please see application enclosure checklist) must be included with your application for the written exam (price may be subject to change) and one payment of \$325 plus GST or HST as applicable for the oral examination.  
**NOTE:** if the written exam is not passed the fee for the oral exam will be returned to the applicant

**Re-examination Fee:** Same as above if written exam is re-taken  
\$325 plus GST or HST as applicable if only the oral exam is re-taken

*These fees include a non-refundable administration fee of \$75 if an application is withdrawn in writing up to 1 week prior to the examination date. Should an applicant withdraw within one week of attempting an exam, under reasonable and verified extenuating circumstances, a non-refundable credit for the full exam fee will be given. This credit must be applied to the next available exam session. A second withdrawal will result in forfeiture of the entire fee.*

*Note: Once a candidate has successfully passed the Certified Pedorthist (Canada) examination, they are required to become a member of The College of Pedorthics of Canada. All certified members must maintain membership in both the Pedorthic Association of Canada and The College of Pedorthics of Canada in order to maintain certification. The College will send an invoice along with a membership information package to successful candidates. The College will not send a certificate or certification numbers until payment and proof of at least \$1 million professional liability insurance is received.*

*If the candidate is already a member in good standing with The College of Pedorthics of Canada as a Certified Pedorthic Technician (Canada), the College will send an invoice for the difference in fees. The candidate will not receive the new certificate until payment is received by The College.*

- Education: Diploma in Pedorthics from the University of Western Ontario

## Option 2: University Degree supplemented by specific Core Courses and Practical Experience as outlined below

- Membership: Applicant must be a Candidate Member in good standing with the Pedorthic Association of Canada (PAC). Membership must be approved and in force for a minimum of thirty days prior to the exam application deadline
- Education: A university degree in
  - Any Health Science
  - Science
  - Engineering

**OR**

Those with a diploma in one of the following related health fields will also be accepted providing they also have a recognized University degree in any field

  - Chiropractic
  - Podiatry
  - Orthotist
- Core Competencies: Successful completion of coursework in the following areas from a CPC recognized university or college:
  - Anatomy
  - Biomechanics/Gait Analysis
  - Medical Conditions/Disease
  - Physical Assessment
  - Ethics
  - ***Starting January 1, 2011 courses in Orthotic fabrication (6012 Advanced Orthotic Systems) and footwear modification (6013 Pedorthic Approach to Footwear & Footwear Modifications) will also be required. These courses are available through the University of Western Ontario's Diploma in Pedorthics program.***
- Practical Experience: 3500 hours in a pedorthic related field including 1500 hours of on site supervised work experience under a qualified C Ped (C).

[Allied health professionals (in a regulated health care field with a minimum of two years active practice in that field) will be granted 500 hours credit towards their 1500 required hours of on site supervised work. A letter of membership in good standing must be presented from the candidate's relevant regulatory body.]

## CONFIDENTIALITY AND RULES OF CONDUCT FOR EXAMINEES

By applying for The Certified Pedorthist (Canada) examination and becoming a Candidate, you agree to abide by the following rules of conduct:

1. All exam candidates acknowledge that The C Ped (C) examination is kept strictly confidential, and as such no materials will be released to candidates after testing other than their test results.
2. All materials created in the course of the Practical component of the examination (marking sheets, video tapes and casts) become the property of The College of Pedorthics of Canada and will not be released to candidates under any circumstances.
3. Candidates understand that under no circumstances are they to remove any part of the examination from the exam room (including any notes made during the Practical examination)
4. Candidates will not be permitted any form of assistance from the Proctor during the exam other than clarification of wording in the written exam component.
5. Candidates engaging in disruptive or inappropriate behaviour during either the written or practical component of the examination may be dismissed by the Proctor and may receive a failing grade on the examination.
6. Candidates understand that by engaging in any form of cheating (as defined below) will result in the Proctor dismissing them from the exam and/or The CPC to take further disciplinary action as appropriate.
  - a. Cheating is defined as any form of dishonesty by the Candidate that results in unfair advantages in results for either themselves or any other Candidates.
  - b. Cheating includes, but is not limited to, the following:
    - i. Making inappropriate requests of the Proctor before, during or after the examination (including solicitation for assistance or exam materials, or any other request that would grant them an unfair advantage in the examination)
    - ii. Removing exam materials from the test site

## MARK VALUES & ATTEMPTS

The C Ped (C) certification process involves two exams - a written exam and a practical exam. Both exams are considered to be at a university level of difficulty. The written and practical exams are held on separate dates, approximately two months apart. Both the written and the practical exams are marked based on a set MPL (Minimum Performance Level) for the exam. Marks will be given as pass or fail as there is no percentage grade. For more information on the MPL system, please refer to the CPC's website at [www.cpedcs.ca](http://www.cpedcs.ca), or contact the office at (866) 819-4354.

The written exam is a **prerequisite** to the practical exam; therefore, a candidate must successfully pass the written exam before becoming eligible for the practical exam. After three failures on the written exam, the candidate must re-qualify by gaining the required experience hours, depending on guideline followed when applying for examination, before being granted another three attempts.

Upon passing the written exam, the candidate has two years to successfully complete the practical exam. A candidate who does not attempt the practical exam within two years of passing the written exam will be required to re-write the written exam. After three failures of the practical exam, the candidate must re-qualify by gaining the required experience hours, depending on guideline followed when applying for examination, and then beginning the full certification process once again.

A candidate is permitted three attempts at each exam (i.e. 3 attempts at written, then 3 attempts at practical) over a five-year period. After a maximum of three unsuccessful attempts at each exam, or the passing of five years, a candidate must re-qualify and restart the certification process.

## EXAM FORMAT

### Written Examination (3 hours)

- 1) 150 multiple choice questions - anatomy, biomechanics/gait analysis, medical conditions & disease, assessment, footwear, orthotic manufacturing, practice management and ethics.

### Practical Examination (1.5 hours)

Candidates must reach the set MPL (minimum performance level) in each category outlined below to obtain a passing grade.

- 1) patient assessment (40 marks, 40 minutes) - assessment for patient history; foot structure; ranges-of-motion; deformities; biomechanical problems; gait abnormalities; proposed management of patient through orthoses, footwear and treatment by other health care professionals
- 2) plaster slipper casting (20 marks, 30 minutes) - determination of proper foot position for casting; casting\*\* one foot, with option of taking second cast and being marked on best of two; explanation of casting position and how cast reflects what was found during assessment; brief description (rationale) of how orthoses would be constructed from cast including cast modifications, materials, design selections  
\*\* plaster bandages (6" rolls) and necessary tools will be provided; candidate may bring own plaster if desired
- 3) shoe fitting (20 marks, 20 minutes) - fitting for patient requiring footwear; marks based on customer approach, footwear knowledge and fitting technique

**Note:** All practical exams are videotaped for marking and appeal purposes.

***All candidates must be aware that their professionalism and conduct in the practical examination will be taken into consideration with regards to the grading of their examination. Any candidates that have conduct deemed unacceptable and contrary to The CPC Code of Ethics is subject to a failing examination result.***

## **EXAM CONTENT**

### **Anatomy of the Lower Limb**

- anatomical terminology for structures and positions (eg., condyle, interphalangeal, abduction, sagittal)
- skeleton, muscles, ligaments, tendons (specific detail re locations, actions, attachments)
- circulatory and nervous systems (only in general - pathways, supplies, pulses)
- surface anatomy (assessment landmarks)
- anatomical anomalies and deformities (eg., hallux limitus, claw toes, equinus, tarsal coalition, etc.)

### **Diseases/Conditions which affect the Lower Limb**

- etiology, symptoms, effects and complications of diseases which affect the legs and feet (eg., Diabetes, Cerebral Palsy, Charcot-Marie-Tooth Disease, Multiple Sclerosis, Arthritis, Poliomyelitis, Sever's Disease, Freiberg's Disease, etc.)
- common acute and overuse injuries (eg., Morton's neuroma; plantar fasciitis; metatarsalgia; Achilles tendonitis; patello-femoral pain syndrome; sprains, strains and fractures; etc.)
- dermatological problems (eg., warts, callouses, corns, etc.)

### **Biomechanics**

- gait determinants (i.e., phases of gait; forces; muscle activity and interactions of joints during gait cycle)
- gait assessment for lower limb problems, eg., recognition of anomalies and typical compensatory actions

### **Pedorthic Assessment**

- Recognition of typical symptomologies through palpation; surface anatomy; ranges-of-motion; patient history; gait analysis; wear patterns; etc.

### **Pedorthic Management**

- generally accepted pedorthic approaches for supporting, accommodating and/or altering biomechanics of children, athletes, adults, and geriatrics
- shoe anatomy and terminology; pedorthic footwear fitting; orthopaedic devices; shoe modifications; orthotic materials; casting procedures; etc. (e.g. - metatarsal bar, Thomas heel, hallux valgus night splint, elevations, wedges, rocker soles, buttresses/flares; fitting checkpoints, foam impression, plaster casting, etc.)

- content of The College of Pedorthics of Canada and the Pedorthic Association of Canada's Code of Ethics and Scope of Practice.

- joints - ankle, crural, hip, interphalangeal, metatarsal-cuneiform, metatarso-phalangeal, subtalar, talo-crural
- acetabulum, apophysis, base, condyle, head, notch, periosteum, plateau, process, malleolus, shaft, tubercle, tuberosity

### **Circulatory & Nervous Systems**

- central nervous system, common peroneal nerve, deep peroneal nerve, dorsalis pedis pulse, popliteal nerve, posterior tibial pulse, sciatic nerve, tibial nerve, venous insufficiency
